## L'adies' Aid Societies

At a time when women were not allowed to participate in public life without challenging the social and legal boundaries imposed on them, it was acceptable to make charity work their "career" because society saw that as an outgrowth of being a wife or a mother.

Throughout the 1800s, women used this as leverage to form female benevolent societies and other voluntary associations where they were able to network, form partnerships and develop valuable skills that they used to advocate for meaningful change, including participating in a 100-year struggle to secure the right to vote for women, which happened in 1920. A legacy they passed on to future generations of women.

The American Civil War years (1861-1865) saw a marked increase in ladies' aid societies and soldiers' aid societies, growing from 7,000 to 20,000. These women provided supplies to soldiers on the battlefield and cared for sick and wounded soldiers. By providing sanitary supplies and blankets, they helped lessen the spread of diseases. In the North, their work was supported by the U.S. Sanitary Commission.

At the end of the Civil War, many ladies' aid societies in the South transformed into memorial associations. Free black women often formed their own ladies' aid societies, like the Colored Ladies Soldiers' Aid Society of St. Louis, Missouri, headed by Mary Meachum, which tended to black Union soldiers at the local hospital.

#### The Sanitary Commission

Of the war casualties, for every <u>one</u> man that died during the Civil War, <u>two</u> people died from disease. Dysentery, diarrhea, typhoid and malaria were all diseases caused by overcrowding and unsanitary conditions during the war.

People began addressing the importance of having clean water, clean food, and fresh air to breathe. Women took the initiative. They began collecting food, clothing, medicine, or anything usable for the soldiers in need. But there was one problem. How they would be able to deliver the supplies to the soldiers?

To address that need, women held a conference in New York for doctors, lawyers, and clergymen interested in helping the soldiers. The result of this was the formation of the Sanitary Commission, organized, run, and supplied by the civilians.

#### After the Civil War

When the war was over, soldiers who came home were still in need of medical care, so many ladies' aid societies continued to support hospitals and war veterans. As they volunteered, women picked up nursing skills which enabled them to pursue a career in nursing.

## Quiz: When did Mother's Day Begin?

- A. In 1872, when Boston poet, pacifist and women's suffragist Julia Ward Howe established a special day for mothers—and for peace—not long after the bloody Franco-Prussian War.
- **B.** In 1858, when Ann Jarvis, a young Appalachian homemaker, organized "Mother's Work Days" to improve the sanitation and avert deaths from disease-bearing insects and seepage of polluted water.
- C. In 1905, when Ann Jarvis died. Her daughter, Anna, decided to memorialize her mother's lifelong activism, and began a campaign that culminated in 1914 when Congress passed a Mother's Day resolution.

The answer is: ALL OF THE ABOVE. Each woman and each of these events contributed to this special occasion we celebrate on the second Sunday in May!!

A. The cause of world peace was the impetus for **Julia Ward Howe** to establish, over a century ago, a special day for mothers. Following unsuccessful efforts to pull together an international pacifist conference after the Franco-Prussian War, Howe began to think of a global appeal to women.

"While the war was still in progress," she wrote, she keenly felt the "cruel and unnecessary character of the contest." She believed, as woman did, that it could be settled without bloodshed. And, she wondered, "Why do not the mothers of mankind interfere in these matters to prevent the waste of that human life of which they alone bear and know the cost?"

Howe's version of Mother's Day, an occasion for advocating peace, was held successfully in Boston and elsewhere for several years, but eventually disappeared from public notice in the years preceding World War I.

**3.** For Ann Jarvis, also known as "**Mother Jarvis**," community improvement by mothers was only a beginning. Throughout the Civil War she organized women's brigades, asking her workers to do all they could without regard for which side their men had chosen. In 1868, she took the initiative to heal the bitter rifts between her Confederate and Union neighbors.

In 1878, when the younger Anna Jarvis was only twelve years old, she heard her mother teach a Sunday school lesson on mothers in the Bible. In Mother Jarvis' own words: "I hope and pray that someone, sometime, will found a memorial mother's day. There are many days for men, but none for mothers."


C. Following her mother's death, **Anna Jarvis** started a remarkable campaign. She sent a constant stream of letters to men of prominence, like President William Taft and former President Theodore Roosevelt, and enlisted considerable help from Philadelphia merchant John Wannamaker.

In May 1907, she arranged for a Mother's Day service on the second Sunday in May at the Methodist Church in Grafton, WV, where Mother Jarvis had taught. That same day a special service was held at the Wannamaker Auditorium in Philadelphia, which had only 5,000 seats for the 15,000 people who showed up.

After that, the custom spread to churches in 45 states and in Puerto Rico, Hawaii, Mexico and Canada. The Governor of West Virginia proclaimed Mother's Day in 1912; followed by the Pennsylvania's governor in 1913. In 1914, the Congressional Resolution was passed and signed by President Woodrow Wilson.

Mother's Day has endured and serves now, as it originally did, to recognize the contributions of women. Mother's Day, like the job of "mothering," is varied and diverse. It is only appropriate to have a day honoring the multiple ways women nurture their families, and the multiple ways they nurture their communities, their countries, and the larger world.


