Alice Paul (January 11, 1885 -1977)

Suffragist leader and founder of National Women's Party in 1916. Her strategies helped pass the 19th Amendment giving women the right to vote. She initiated the Equal Rights Amendment in 1923

Betty White (January 17, 1922 -2021)

Television pioneer and veteran actress. Her later TV roles included *Mama's Family, The Golden Girls,* and *Hot in Cleveland.* Advocate of animal welfare

Nancy Dickerson (January 19, 1927 -1997)

The first woman on NBC to go on assignment worldwide from 1986-91 and Producer of *Face the Nation*

Julia Morgan (January 20, 1872 - 1957)

The first woman licensed architect in California
Innovative architect of Hearst Castle and over 700 extraordinary buildings.

Maria Tallchief (January 24, 1925 -2013)

World-renowned ballerina and one of the premiere American ballerinas of all time.

Bessie Coleman (January 26, 1892 -1926)

The first African-American woman in the world to fly a plane and earn an international pilot's license.

January Highlights in Women's History

- **January 3,** 1949: Margaret Chase Smith (R-Maine) started her tenure in the Senate, where she stayed in office until 1973, becoming the first woman to serve in both the House and Senate as she previously served in the House (1940-49).
- **January 4**, 2007: Nancy Pelosi (D-Calif) became the first female speaker of the House of Representatives. In 2019 she reclaimed the title, becoming the first lawmaker to hold the office two times in more than 50 years.
- **January 5**, 1925: Nellie Taylor Ross was inaugurated as the first woman Governor in U.S. history (Governor of Wyoming).
- **January 7**, 1896: Fanny Farmer's first cookbook was published in which she standardized cooking measurements.
- **January 7,** 1955: Marian Anderson was the first African American woman to sing at the Metropolitan Opera.
- January 8, 1977: Anna Pauline "Pauli" Murray was the first African American woman ordained to the Episcopal priesthood, by Bishop William F. Creighton at Washington National Cathedral in Washington D.C.
- January 11, 1935: Amelia Earhart made the first solo flight from Hawaii to North America.
- **January 12,** 1932: Hattie Wyatt Caraway (D-Arkansas) was the first woman elected to the U.S. Senate. She was the first woman to chair a Senate Committee and the first to serve as the Senate's presiding officer.
- **January 20,** 2021: Kamala Harris was the first woman and first woman of color sworn in as vice-president of the United States.
- **January 22,** 1973: In Roe v. Wade, the Supreme Court ruled the Constitution protects a woman's legal right to an abortion. In June 2022, the Supreme Court overturned the ruling.
- January 23, 1997: Madeleine Albright was sworn in as the nation's first female secretary of state.
- **January 24,** 2013: The U.S. miliary removed a ban against women serving in combat positions.
- **January 25**, 1890: Nellie Bly, journalist, completed her around the world trip in 72 days, 6 hours, 11 minutes, and 14 seconds after setting sail east to prove she could circle the globe in less than 80 days.
- **January 25,** 1980: Mary Decker became the first woman to run a mile under 4 1/2 minutes, running it at 4:17.55
- **January 29,** 1926: Violette Neatly Anderson was the first black woman to practice law before the U.S. Supreme Court.

WOMEN IN MALE DOMINATED FIELDS - POLITICAL LEADERS SERIES

#4: WOMEN APPOINTED HEAD OF STATE IN THE MONTH OF JANUARY

January 1, 2011: Dilma Rousseff

36th President of Brazil from 2011 to 2016, the only woman to serve as president of Brazil. She was impeached and removed from office in 2016 and cleared of all charges in 2022 by the Brazilian Judicial System. As a high school student, she joined the underground movement against the Brazilian military dictatorship, was arrested in 1970, tortured and released from jail in 1972. She went on to become an economist and politician who served in a number of administrations and was responsible for "Light for Everyone", a program that expanded rural electrification to millions of households in the countryside.

January 5, 2012: Portia Simpson-Miller

7th Prime Minister of Jamaica from 2012 to 2016 and earlier from 2006 to 2007, the first female head of government of Jamaica. She also served as the leader of the People's National Party from 2005 to 2017. She supports replacing the Jamaican monarchy with an elected president and formally endorsed civil rights for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender citizens during her election campaign.

January 6, 2009: Sheik Hasina

Prime Minister of Bangladesh from January 2009 to August 2024 and before that from June 1996 to July 2001. Hasina is the longest-serving prime minister in Bangladesh history and the world's longest-serving female head of government. Her early pro-democratic regime raised millions of people out of poverty and created a thriving economy, but as she became more autocratic in her later years, inequities and social unrest caused political uprisings and demands for her resignation. She went into self-imposed exile in 2024.

January 16, 2006: Ellen Johnson Sirleaf

24th President of Liberia, serving from 2006 to 2018, the first elected female head of state in Africa. Sirleaf used her presidency to rebuild post-conflict war-torn Liberia, revitalize its national economy and infrastructure, and restore Liberia's international reputation and credibility. Due to term limitations, Sirleaf could not run for office a third time. She is considered the best president Liberia has ever had.

January 20, 1975: Elisabeth Domitien

2nd Prime Minister of the Central African Republic from 1975 to 1976, her country's first prime minister and the first female prime minister in any country in Africa. In 1973 she led the first national congress of Central African farmers and worked to strengthen the income and position of women. After opposing the plan of her country's president to declare himself emperor, she was fired, her cabinet dismissed and given a brief prison term.

January 20, 2001: Gloria Macapagal Arroyo

14th President of the Philippines from 2001 to 2010, the longest-serving president since Ferdinand Marcos. She was a professor of economics and one of only two Filipinos to hold at least three of the four highest offices in the Philippines: Vice President, President and House Speaker.

January 22, 2014: Laimdota Strauiuma

21st Prime Minister of Latvia from 2014 to 2016. As Latvia's first female prime minister, she focused on strengthening Latvia's national defense when Russian illegally annexed Crimea and prepared Latvia for its role as rotating president of the European Union Council of Ministers in 2015. When Latvia left the Soviet Union in 1991, Laimdota used her doctorate in agricultural economics to help Latvian farmers adapt to a market-based environment and later successfully campaigned to increase contributions by the European Union to Latvian farmers.

#4: WOMEN APPOINTED HEAD OF STATE IN THE MONTH OF JANUARY

January 23, 2014: Catherine Samba-Panza

Transitional President of the Central African Republic from 2014 to 2016, the first woman to serve as head of state in the Central African Republic. She served as transitional president after the country's Civil War and restored stability to the nation, disarmed militant groups, and emphasized economic recovery through employment and foreign aid. She supported women in government, assistance for sexual violence victims, ending female genital mutilation, and African governments doing more to further women-owned businesses.

January 24, 1966: Indira Gandhi

3rd Prime Minister of India from 1966 to 1977 and later from 1980 until her assassination in 1984. In 1971 she went to war with Pakistan to support the war of independence in East Pakistan, securing an Indian victory and the independence of Bangladesh, as well as increasing India's influence to the point where it became the sole regional power in South Asia.

January 24, 2005: Yulia Tymoshenko

Prime Minister of Ukraine in from January to September 2005 and again from December 2007 to March 2010, the first and only woman to hold that position in Ukraine. She supported NATO membership for Ukraine and Ukraine's integration into the European Union rather than into the Russian Union. She was jailed from 2011 to 2014 under Ukraine's Pro-Russia President Yanukovych, then released by the Supreme Court of Ukraine and the European Court of Human Rights when Zelenskyy became Ukraine president. She consistently receives awards for her ongoing defense of democracy, freedom and the struggle to restore the rule of law in Ukraine.

January 25, 2023: Borjana Kristo

Chair of the Council of Ministers of Bosnia and Herzegovina from January 2023 to today. She previously served as the 8th president of Bosnia and Herzegovina from 2007 to 2011, the first woman to hold both positions. She is leading the charge to address conflicts of interests, money laundering, terrorist financing and other reforms needed to clear the way for Bosnia and Herzegovina's accession into the European Union.

January 26, 2021: Kaja Kallas

19th Prime Minister of Estonia, serving from 2022 until 2024, when she resigned to become the High Representative of the European Union for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy. When Russian invaded Ukraine, Kalas was praised domestically for sending military equipment to Ukraine, supporting admission of Ukraine to the European Union and demanding the European Union introduce sanctions against Russia. She warned against "peace at any price" with Russia and has been referred to as "Europe's New Iron Lady."

January 27, 2022: Xiomara Castro

39th President of Honduras, serving from 2022 to today, the country's first female president, and also first lady during the presidency of her husband Manuel Zelaya. She is the first president from outside the country's two-party system since democracy was restored in 1982.

January 28, 2016 and January 3, 2024: Hilda Heine

8th and 10th President of the Marshall Islands, serving from 2016 to 2020, and from 2024 to today. Heine is the first woman to lead any sovereign country in Micronesia and the first person from the Marshall Islands to earn a doctorate. She is a women's rights activist and has taken an international role in addressing climate change since becoming president.

January 29, 2018: Viorica Dancila

67th Prime Minister of Romania, serving from January 2018 to November 2019, the first woman in Romania history to hold both the office of Prime Minister and that of president of the Social Democratic Party (PSD). She also served on the Committee on Women's Rights and Gender Equality and secured her party's commitment to have at least 30% female candidates on the slates they put forward for elections.
